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HOW TO FIND US

We encourage parents and children to walk to school. Parking is a challenge and we would urge all visitors to park away from Prince's Gate.

Public Transport bus service

52, 9, 10, 452 buses from Knightsbridge stop outside the school, and almost opposite the school from the High Street Kensington direction.

Underground Stations

High Street Kensington, South Kensington, Knightsbridge are approximately a 10 minute walk from the school.

Cycles and Micro-scooters

We encourage the use of micro-scooters. They may be left at the owner's risk in the basement 'cage' of house 23. Unfortunately we cannot accommodate bicycles.

Parking

There is no legal parking in Prince's Gate. Traffic wardens patrol regularly. We have been granted a 10-minute window for drop off or pick up. We try to be good neighbours and ask parents to be especially sensitive to the private parking bays. To avoid a penalty charge and if you need more than 10 minutes you should park in Hyde Park (opposite the school) or on a metered parking bay. Those driving to school must register their car and we will provide you with a badge to be displayed in the windscreen which will alert traffic wardens you are with the school. However, the 10 minutes is a discretionary period only.

School Bus Service

We offer a minibus service for morning collection and afternoon return. There is a termly charge for this service. Details are available from the office.

How do we deliver our aims?

- There is a high staff to pupil ratio, and all children have a class teacher who has responsibility for the pastoral care and academic progress of their class
- High academic standards and a sense of self-worth are achieved through the provision of a carefully structured day in which each child strives towards goals that are challenging, yet achievable
- Children have access to a balanced and broad curriculum of skills, concepts and knowledge based on the Montessori Method (Early Years), the National and ISEB Curricula and extending beyond
- Work is planned appropriately for children of all abilities, using ability groupings within each class or year and is rewarded within the house-point system
- Children's best efforts are celebrated in many ways, including recognition in assemblies
- Children are taught to respect others and have the opportunity to care for the younger and newer children of the school
- There is a House system that builds up children's sense of responsibility in work, behaviour, cultural events, and provides a vertically grouped sense of family

ATTENDANCE

Over the course of the academic year, we wish your child to make the best progress possible. In order to achieve this and to make the most of all the experiences on offer to him or her, we expect every pupil to be present for the whole of every school day throughout the year, and for any planned out-of-school activity. Parents are responsible for ensuring their child attends school, and it is important that children are in school on time. It is a legal requirement for schools to track and report attendance and follow up absences.

By law, parents whose children are of compulsory school age (5 to 16) and registered at school are responsible for ensuring that their children attend school regularly.

Valid reasons for non-attendance may include: illness, medical and dental appointments, day of religious observance, family bereavements, interviews, external exams and attendance for visa/ passport appointments. Holiday is not a valid reason for an absence.

Any requests for absence in term time due to holiday will not be authorised by the Headmistress.

All absence requests must be made directly to the Headmistress at least two weeks in advance.

Absence for Medical Reasons

In the case of doctors, hospital or dental appointments, please inform Mrs Walker and your child's class teacher in writing, two days in advance of the day of absence.

Absence through illness

If your child is not well enough to attend school please do not send them in. Keep your child at home long enough to ensure there is neither risk of infection for other children nor any danger that your child might suffer some form of relapse. If your child has had diarrhoea or vomiting, 48 hours should elapse from the last episode before they can return to school. Please report your child's absence by 9:00am by calling the school office and leaving a message on the absence extension line (020 7225 1277 ext. 1). Once your child returns to school fully recovered, please send in a note indicating the nature of the problem.

Absence from swimming

We appreciate that it can take a few days for a child to recover fully from an episode of illness. If this means your child is unable to participate in their weekly swimming lesson for a short period, please supply a note for the swimming teacher stating the reason. In this case, pupils will be expected to attend swimming, but will sit and watch the session. In order to aid the child's recovery, pupils who do not swim due to illness will not be permitted to take part in after school sports clubs for the duration of this period.

AFTER SCHOOL CARE AND CLUBS

It is very important that the class teacher knows who will be collecting your child. If there is any change to the normal arrangements, you need to let the class teacher know. Children will not be allowed to go home with adults who are unfamiliar to the school. Parents should write in the home-school diary if someone different is collecting a child from school and send the name & contact details of this person in advance to the teacher and the school office.

Siblings Club

Siblings Club is for children who are waiting to leave school with an older sibling. It runs from 15.00 until 16.00 Monday to Friday and must be booked on a half-termly basis in advance via the school office. All Early Years children must be collected by 16.00.

Homework Club

Homework Club runs from 16.00 until 17.00 Monday to Thursday for years 3-6 and for children in years 1 & 2 only on Fridays from 15.20 until 16.00.

Siblings Teatime Session

This session will run from 16.00 until 17.00 Monday to Thursday and is for children in Years 1 and 2 who are waiting to go home with an older sibling who is attending a club. There is a charge of £10 per session to be paid for a term in advance. Please book via the school office.

Clubs

These play a large part in school life, with a wide variety of activities available. The clubs programme widens as the children get older and can cope with a longer school day. There is an extra charge for some clubs. Breakfast club is available from 8.00-8.30am for children in Years 1-6 only. A list of clubs is emailed to parents before the end of the previous term. Additionally, a detailed list of the clubs is also available on request at the office.

Music

There are many opportunities to take part in ensembles within the school club system as well as through the curriculum itself. Some groups are invitational, some are open to all. Parents who wish their child to learn an instrument should contact the Head of Music, Mr Mark Batten, mark.batten@stnicholasprep.co.uk

The children have an assembly up to three times a week and may celebrate the festivals of all the major faiths in the world. Each class presents two class assemblies and a music assembly over the course of the year, to which parents are invited. Each Friday certificates are awarded for special achievements. House point badges are also awarded in assemblies.

From time to time visitors are invited to speak to the children. These may include parents, people in the community and representatives from major charities, police or fire officers.

BEHAVIOUR

St Nicholas emphasises personal responsibility. All children make mistakes and we aim to address these positively and constructively to help them learn. This applies to children throughout the school. We encourage good behaviour and we seek to recognise and reward this by a variety of means. Similarly, teachers will respond appropriately to disruptive behaviour.

The school has a Behaviour Code which pupils and parents are asked to sign at the start of each academic year. We also have 'Golden Rules' which are displayed in classrooms and support the children in being kind, helpful and encouraging members of our school community. Additionally, children help to formulate ground rules for their class.

CALENDAR

At the beginning of each term, a calendar of all events in school is given to parents and children. Events to which parents are invited will be printed in bold. The calendar is also available on the School's website.

CHILD PROTECTION / SAFEGUARDING

The school's Designated Safeguarding Lead is Mrs Samantha Gibbon supported by Miss Katie Paynter for Early Years. They ensure all children are safe and well cared for at school and at home. If you are concerned about the well-being of any child at the school please approach these members of staff to discuss your concerns. All adults have a responsibility to ensure all children with whom they have contact are safe and well cared for.

CNED

(Centre National d'Enseignement a Distance)

St Nicholas Preparatory School is an English National Curriculum School. However, children whose mother tongue is French have the opportunity to follow a dual programme of English and the CNED. They are registered in an English class but for 5 hours a week they study language and maths separately with a qualified French national teacher at either CP, CE1, CE2, CM1, or CM2. Inevitably, the children will miss part of the English curriculum and from year to year we cannot guarantee which subjects will be affected but we seek to protect literacy, numeracy and science in Years 5 and 6. The CNED programme is demanding and pupils following this are expected to catch up on any work missed from the school's main curriculum.

COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

The school has a complaints procedure in place. In the first instance, parents should raise any concerns with their child's class teacher so that the matter can be resolved quickly and informally. It is expected that the vast majority of complaints will be resolved through an informal approach. If parents remain dissatisfied then they should move to the next step as stated in the school's complaints procedure. This is available on the school website and from the school office.

CURRICULUM

Early Years

The Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum is organised into seven areas of development and learning. There are 7 areas of Learning and Development and 17 Early Learning Goals connected to one another and equally important.

Three Prime Areas

- Communication and language
- Physical development
- Personal, social and emotional development

Four Specific Areas

- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the world
- Expressive arts and design

Key Stage One

This consists of pupils aged 5 to 7 in Key Stage 1, or Years 1 and 2 of the National Curriculum. This prescribes the skills and knowledge that children should learn in the primary years. Emphasis is placed upon the basic skills of reading, writing and numeracy.

Year 1 and 2 pupils are taught by their class teacher in their own classroom, with the benefit of a Class Teaching Assistant, and with specialist teaching in music, art, PE, games and French. Year 2 pupils also enjoy a weekly specialist drama lesson. The children also broaden their education through Personal, Social, Health and Economic education. A full range of learning support is also available for children who would benefit from extra help with their learning.

Homework takes learning into the home. It should encourage pupils to develop the skills, confidence and motivation needed to study effectively on their own. Homework helps to consolidate, extend and reinforce skills and understanding developed at school. It promotes creativity through freedom and choice and fosters independence. Homework is for the child not for the parent but parental support is always appreciated. Homework is set on Fridays to be handed in the following week.

Key Stage Two

This consists of pupils aged 7 to 11 in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 of the National Curriculum. In Years 3 and 4, maths, English, science, ICT, humanities (including RE) and PSHE education are taught by the class teacher. Specialist teachers deliver lessons in music, art, French, sport/PE, swimming and drama. In Years 5 and 6 pupils also have specialist teaching in maths, English and humanities. Excellent pastoral care is our highest priority, and each class has its own class teacher and a class base where they spend much of the day. If you have any concerns about the welfare of your child, the class teacher should be your first point of contact.

Homework

In Years 3 to 6, pupils are given a homework timetable, with different subjects set on specific days of the week. This enables pupils to organise their time and promotes the children's independence ready for their eventual transfer to senior school. Pupils record homework in their planner which needs to be signed on a daily basis by a parent / carer.

11+ Entry to Senior Schools

The school prepares pupils rigorously for successful entry to senior school at 11+, according to each child's academic profile. This preparation becomes more explicit from Year 4 onwards. This includes weekly lessons in verbal and non-verbal reasoning and interview practice and critical thinking skills. By the summer term of Year 5, the children are regularly completing timed practice papers and in the autumn term of Year 6, where appropriate, pupils are prepared for scholarship entry. The Headmistress meets individually with parents of pupils in Year 5 and Year 6 to discuss senior school choices. She also gives a talk in the spring term on the 11+ process which all parents are invited to attend. Formal exams are held for Years 4, 5 and 6 in the autumn term and for Years 4 and 5 in the summer term. There is a vibrant post 11+ programme for Year 6.

FOOD

School lunch is provided for all children. All food is cooked and prepared on site in our own kitchens. Children are encouraged to take three kinds of food on their plate i.e. meat or protein, vegetables or salad and carbohydrate. A vegetarian alternative is offered. If your child has a food allergy (particularly nut allergies), please ensure you return your data collection form before term starts. All medical needs and other dietary requirements must be supported by a letter from a doctor.

Birthday cakes are permitted in school but they must not contain nuts. A list of ingredients/ original box/ recipe must be supplied. Pre-cut cakes or cupcakes are easiest to share.

HEALTH AND WELFARE

Illness and Medicine

All children need to be registered with a GP (Doctor).

Parents must inform the School of any ongoing medical need, e.g. asthma. If your child is returning to school and needs to continue to take 'prescribed' medicines during the school day, these medicines must be clearly labelled with your child's name and must be handed to the office and collected by an adult. All medicines must be listed on our register. We are allowed to dispense medicines prescribed by your doctor; however, you will need to call into the Office to complete a 'Medicines in School' permission form in order for us to do this for you.

If you suspect that your child has an infectious or contagious illness please let us know.

Please Note: We are unable to give 'over the counter medicines' (this includes cough sweets).

It is important you let the school office and the class teacher know if your child has an existing allergy including asthma and eczema or is likely to have an allergic reaction to a particular food, or bee stings, so that we can update our records.

In schools there is always the possibility that your child may catch head lice. We recommend that you check your child for lice weekly. For information on how to treat head lice please visit the NHS website at <http://www.nhs.uk/Conditions/Head-lice/Pages/Introduction.aspx>

Emergency Medical Treatment

In the event of an accident or illness requiring medical attention every effort will be made to contact the parents or the designated carer. For this reason it is vital that telephone numbers given to the school are up to date and ready to be answered, especially when parents are going abroad. If we are unable to make contact then the school takes responsibility for obtaining the necessary attention.

HOUSE SYSTEM

The House system is an integral part of what we do every day. House points are earned for work, behaviour or initiative, showing responsibility. Our three Houses are named after famous explorers: Scott (blue); Livingstone (red); Shackleton (green). In Reception to Year 6, individual children who collect 100 House Points or more are rewarded with badges. A special cup - the Rosemary Hinde Cup - is presented to the winning House on Sports Day. Inter-house competitions give children access to other cultural opportunities and are growing in number.

Siblings will normally be put in the same House. Children stay in the same House throughout their time at St Nicholas.

IPADS AND ELECTRICAL DEVICES

Pupils use iPads in school and are not permitted to bring into school or on a school trip any form of electrical storage device unless with specific permission and only if they have been checked and screened by school staff as appropriate.

LEARNING SUPPORT

If you have any concerns about any aspect of your child's progress or development, do please discuss this with the class teacher in the first instance. If there are concerns, the school SENCO (Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator) will carry out observations of your child and give additional help where appropriate. In some instances it may be necessary to recommend further assessments and support from specialist outside agencies. In all cases parents will be kept fully informed of the action that is recommended. If the school believes your child would benefit from 1:1 or small group support lessons to assist their academic progress then these can be delivered on site by the SENCO or Teaching Assistant. There may be an additional charge for these lessons and this is added to the end of term bill. Please see the school website and/or speak to the bursar for details about cost.

ENGLISH AS AN ADDITIONAL LANGUAGE

A number of children who come to St Nicholas are learning English as an Additional Language (EAL). Most of them are able to benefit from the bi-lingual opportunity that our education offers, but some require support through individual or small group tuition. For this reason, we have two full time members of staff who are able to provide the help needed.

LIBRARY

We have a well-stocked Library of over 4,000 books which is a real asset to the school. All classes from Reception upwards have a Library session once a week. A love of reading is nurtured from an early age, as are valuable research skills. Children should feel free to browse, read, and they are encouraged to borrow books. Parents are most welcome to discuss their child's independent reading with the class English teacher. Our annual Book Week is one of the highlights of the school year. Reading lists are sent out recommending books that support the curriculum.

LOST PROPERTY

Please ensure all items of clothing are named and that you encourage your child to take responsibility for his or her belongings. There are plastic bins situated in nursery and the reception area for items without identification. Parents may search through these bins, but please only take property that belongs to you. The best way to ensure your child gets property back is to name it.

COMMUNICATION

At the beginning of each term, parents are sent a letter from the class teacher and a Subject Summary outlining the curriculum areas that will be covered. In addition, parents receive a short weekly letter from the class teacher that details class news. On Fridays, the school sends out a weekly bulletin keeping you updated on school events and news along with a message from the Headmistress. The lunch menu for the following week is also made available. Increasingly, we use our website for publishing up-to-date news and school events, so we ask parents to check it carefully on a regular basis.

THE OFFICE

The Office is open Monday to Friday from 08:00 to 17:00 during term time and 09:30-16:00 during school holidays. The office is shut between Christmas and New Year. All enquiries and messages should go through the receptionist. Cheques to the school should always be made payable to St Nicholas Preparatory School Ltd.

FRIENDS OF ST NICHOLAS

FRIENDS OF ST NICHOLAS is a social organisation which co-ordinates events, coffee mornings, second hand uniform sales and much more! Participation is voluntary and all parents are welcome to join! There is something for everyone with Friends. For parents, we organise visits to local landmarks and museums, a 'Welcome' drinks evening, and opportunities to make new friends within the parent community; for the children, we plan several fun activities each year like a school disco or a summer circus. The Friends of St Nicholas also raise money for charity through bake sales and an annual Fun Run. These are just a few examples of some of the fantastic ways Friends contributes to our wonderful school community. REPORTS AND PARENT / TEACHER MEETINGS

We value strong communication between home and school, and wish to give you feedback on your child's progress, attainment, and overall performance in school. Written core subject reports are provided at the end of the autumn term and full written reports at the end of the summer term. There are formal face-to-face consultation meetings held with teachers for all year groups in the first half of the autumn term, the spring term and for Years 4 and 5 in the summer term. Parents are most welcome to make an informal appointment to discuss their child with teachers at any time. All parents are supplied with their child's class teacher's email address.

TRIPS AND VISITS

School trips make an essential contribution to the education and personal development of pupils at St Nicholas Preparatory School. In Years 3 to 6 this includes residential trips appropriate to the age and stage of each Year group. Trip payments are charged in advance on the termly bill.

UNIFORM

School uniform must be worn by all children and a full uniform list is available from the Office. School shoes should be black (not trainers) and a school coat is compulsory. Earrings are permitted but should be a sleeper or stud only and must be removed for games lessons. No other jewellery is permitted. Shoulder length hair must be tied back with hair accessories in school colours (white, black, maroon or navy blue). Plain Alice bands are permitted. Our uniform is available to order online from Perry (www.perryuniform.co.uk).
